Dear Mr. Gilman,

As the summer is now about
at an end, I feel that I should write
you a short note, to report progress
and to express my gratitude that

the University authorities, I have been
able to spend such a pleasant six
months. The Summer Semester in
Leipsic was very enjoyable, and
my work, chiefly on the Nervous
system, was very satisfactorily
arranged. Professor Flechsig, the
neurologist. There, was this year
Rector Magnificus of the University

but nevertheless found time to give an interesting series of lectures on the structure of the Brain. These, together with lectures of Professors His, Wundt, and von Frey, formed a valuable course. In August, I was in Switzerland, a part of the time with Dr and Mrs. Hunter Robb, where we benefitted by the bracing air of the upper Engadine.

Prof. Mall & Mrs. Mall are looking exceedingly well after their long tramp in the Tirol. They sail from Southampton today. Prof. Rensen whom I saw the other day at Brown Shipley's gives healthful evidence of his trip to the Scottish Moors. The little army of Hopkins students (Knox, Coe, Steele, Lyon, Hamburger, Calvert, Hastings, Dawson, Mitchell &c) has made good use of its time, and those of them who avoided English speaking people have picked up a good deal of German.

The laboratories ~~have~~ in London are for the most part deserted, except by cleaners and painters, but as this is my first visit here, I find plenty to do in seeing the sights. - Hoping soon to be again in Baltimore.
