

Queried as to the cause of the fire, Dr. Corwin said that it was a "freak accident" and occurred while Mr. Paul Alisea was dehydrating distilled benzene. Dr. Corwin emphasized that a reaction between sodium and water was not the cause of the fire, as only minute quantities of water remain after the fractional distillation of benzene.

Exact cause of the accident will not be determined until Alisea has recovered sufficiently to be questioned.

Dr. Corwin said that, as in the case of all laboratory accidents, a careful investigation will be made to determine how such a mishap can be prevented in the future.






